Tradition has it that the first English hop garden was created near Canterbury in 1520. Kent became the earliest centre for hop culture and today retains this pre-eminence. Farming techniques and technical innovations developed particularly in the 19th century, and oast houses were a familiar sight until relatively recently. The industry has faced considerable challenges in recent decades but today are now twenty-seven commercially-grown British hop varieties whereas in 1998 there were only thirteen. The British Hop Association, led by Tony Redsell, has been pivotal in this renaissance in terms of scientific hop development and research.

Tony Redsell is one of Britain's leading hop growers and farms extensively in Faversham, Canterbury, and Thanet. Tony's contribution to hop growing and to the industry is legendary. When he stepped down in 2012 as the Chairman of the British Hop Association his leadership of the Association had spanned an incredible four decades.
